




THE ORCHARD CHURCH

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THE BIBLE AND BIOETHICS: In But Not Of The World

Technological advancement provides many benefits in the bioethical realm. But often the ability to do something surpasses the ethical question of whether we should do something. There is an important distinction between an is, what can be done, and an ought, what should or must be done, particularly in the ethical and bioethical realm.

Often these bioethical questions are not thought about before being faced with an ethical, existential moment. At that crisis point, it is difficult to think wisely and discerningly. When we face life issues – either love for another (in end-of-life decisions) or a sense of entitlement (in reproductive matters) – we are almost always pressed to an ought, without thinking through the ethics and morality of the matter. The time to think about such matters is before that existential moment

Added to these ethical matters is our present cultural moment. There may have been a time when the church and cultural mores were similar. The church did not have to teach or press some of the moral matters because they were affirmed in the culture. That is no longer the case, and yet, the culture continues to catechize the people of God, the church. We are living at a time when not only are the ethics, bioethics and morality not embraced by the culture, they are despised. And often we have not rightly understood these issues ourselves, and thus we have been unable or unwilling to teach/catechize God's people on these critical matters.

Here are a few things to consider in the realm of biblical ethics and bioethics:

• Foundation for Biblical Ethics and Bioethics

The concern is that too few understand how to move from the Bible to theology to ethics to bioethics. The past two years have shown that we have a lot of ground to cover when it comes to understanding moral/ethical theology in the public realm. Furthermore, the church has expected the culture to reflect biblical and ethical mores, to affirm the ethics/morality of the church and the church has also allowed the culture to teach and model acceptable ethical norms. That day is no more (if it ever was), so that now when the culture no longer reflects those ethical matters, and in fact is antagonistically opposed

to them, the church needs to catechize in the moral/ethical realm once again, both in content and character. In this way the church will manifest her heavenly citizenship while living in the world.

- Biotechnology, Genetic Engineering and Artificial Reproductive Technologis (ART):
 AIF, AID, GIFT, ZIFT, IVP, Surrogacy, Etc.
 - These are several of the issues we are addressing in the church. Consider this: how many of these issues do you address during premarital counseling? Many married couples conclude if they want a child, they deserve a child. What happens if/when that couple experiences infertility? If that is the case, how do they go about having a child? Not all these means are ethical/moral or God-honoring. What is and is not acceptable as Christians?
- Abortion, End of Life Treatment, Alzheimer's, Assisted Suicide and Euthanasia
 This is another realm we are facing in significant ways. Depending on what happens
 with the SCOTUS decision in Dobbs v. Jackson, Women's Health, Christians and the
 church may have to reconsider our approach to addressing abortion more at the local
 and state level, rather than the federal. And what about the end-of-life treatment? How
 do we help Christian families think about such matters grounded in the sanctity of life
 and the imago Dei? How do we discern if/when we truly and rightly prolong life, and if/
 when we inappropriately delay death? And how do we understand Alzheimer's and the
 imago Dei? Are we equipped/prepared to minister to an increasing number of those who
 have little to no memory? How do we live out the truth that "God will never leave you nor
 forsake you" with them?
- Enhancement, Artificial Intelligence, Transhumanism and Posthumanism

 This is impacting us, and many do not even know it. Our lives are being monitored to the degree that if most knew, they would likely be shocked. And even though this may be considered to be the stuff of science-fiction novels or movies, it continues to make inroads into our lives in increasing measures. An increasing number of people prefer to live a virtual life over against a real, personal, embodied, flesh-and-blood existence or at least a hybrid. For example, consider the metaverse. Many take this very seriously, and this is their hope for eternal life. How much of this is stewarding God's creation for human flourishing and how much is an attempt to build Babel, to be the creator and master of one's own destiny, which fits the expressive individualist spirit of the age.

These are just a few of the major issues we ponder as we consider The Bible and Bioethics. Many more topics could be added.

I am grateful we have Matthew Eppinette, Executive Director of The Center for Bioethics & Human Dignity (CBHD), Affiliate Professor of Bioethics, Trinity International University, with us to address a few of these important issues in our preconference sessions. Grounded in the Scriptures, there is much we will learn as we seek to "understand the times" and to live faithfully, such that we both model and teach how to live joyfully under the sweet sovereignty and purposeful providence of God and the loving Lordship of Jesus Christ in the ethical and bioethical realm of our lives.

INTRODUCTION

We are living and ministering in a postmodern and increasingly post-Christian culture. This has raised issues regarding how we understand the world and the cultural and apologetic issues facing the church. Added to these cultural issues is the pandemic. Not only has living amid a pandemic created issues in and for the church, but it has also manifested and revealed issues within the church.

Consider the many and varied issues before the church of Jesus Christ today, and the differences and divides in how we process those issues, which often lead to divisions and polarizations: politics and identity politics, COVID 19, masks and vaccines, racism and racial justice, virtual church, the body and human sexuality and LGBTQ+, sexual abuse, abuse of power/authority, social media, truthiness or fake news, contemporary critical theory, the radically-absolute-autonomous self, conspiracy theories, nominal Christianity, decreasing church membership (where are the members?), deconstruction, deconversion and apostasy, doctrine and life (content and character), big Eva, Neo-fundamentalism, progressive evangelicalism (theological liberalism), et cetera. It is overwhelming just reading this list, much less living amid them, and often many at the same time.

Jesus teaches that as Christians we are "in but not of the world" (Jn. 17). We, like God, "love the world" (Jn. 3:16) and we "do not love the world" (1 Jn. 2:15-17) at the same time. As Christians, we are strangers and sojourners, exiles who are members of two cities, the city of God and the city of man, while our ultimate "citizenship is in heaven" (Phil. 3:20). The past 18 months have

revealed several gaps in the lives of Christians and in the church. Six plenary messages focus on three different aspects of the challenges we face today: understanding the world (messages 1 and 2), the Christian (messages 3 and 4), and the church (messages 5 and 6). There will also be two breakout sessions on Thursday afternoon.

Part 1

THE WORLD: Explaining the World to the Faithful

In the first two messages, we will seek to understand the postmodern and increasingly post-Christian world. Carl Trueman writes in "The Road to Bostock": "The pressing pastoral need of the hour for the church is not to explain the faith to the world but rather first to explain the world to the faithful. . .. [if we do not understand the culture] that will make it very hard to navigate this world as both good citizens and good stewards of the gospel." There is an "understanding the times" gap, somewhat of a historical time-warp as if we live and minister in a culture of 50-75 years ago. In response we will be attempting to "explain the world to the faithful." After the curtain is lifted on the contemporary world, not only what it is, but how we arrived at this moment, we will then address how Christians and the church ought to respond to and engage with those of the world, being "salt and light" (Matt. 5:13-16). For those who have eschewed God's revelation for human reason/rationalization, even among some Christians, the plausibility structures of belief have changed, and certain defeater beliefs become conversational deadends. This means Christians are considered cultural heretics. Despite this, we are "always prepared to make a defense to anyone who asks for a reason for the hope that is in you" (1 Pet. 3:15).

Part 2

THE CHRISTIAN: In But Not Of

In the third and fourth lectures, we will focus on a biblical world-and-life view, by looking at the Christian and the heart, and the heart of the Christian life. David Wells concludes in *Losing Our Virtue: Why the Church Must Recover Its Moral Vision:* "Worldliness is that system of values, in any given age, which has as its center our fallen human perspective, which displaces God and

his truth from the world, and which makes sin look normal and righteousness seem strange. It thus gives great plausibility to what is morally wrong and, for that reason, makes what is wrong seem normal." There is a catechizing gap, reflecting soteriological and transformational (sanctification) issues. All too often, Christians have engaged in and responded to issues in the ways and means of the world. For example, consider the fissures and fractures, the sifting and sorting, the debates and divisions which may reveal our common belief and mission were in something other than confessing Jesus Christ is Lord. Sadly, there is at times little to distinguish Christian belief and behavior from the world. And Christians have imbibed radical, individual autonomy, the modern self. In contrast, the Christian has been called to cross-bearing (Mk. 8:34-38), bearing the life of the cross and crucifixion (Gal. 2:20).

BREAKOUTS

We will provide four different options during our two breakout sessions. The four messages will be repeated in the second breakout session, which will allow you to participate in two of the breakouts. It would be accurate to conclude these four topics could also have been considered plenary messages. The issues are that important. And yet the difference is that in the breakout sessions we are going deeper on a few key issues that are critical for us to learn about and discuss. These sessions will consist of instruction and provide some time for Q&A and discussion. All these breakout topics are excellent, which will make it difficult for you to decide what two to attend. Be assured, all will be recorded.

Part 3

THE CHURCH: A Manifestation of the Gospel A Hope-Filled, Eschatological Apologetic

In the fifth and sixth messages, we will focus on the church. Christopher J. H. Wright concludes in *Here Are Your Gods: Faithful Discipleship in Idolatrous Times* that idols and idolatry remain a temptation among God's people, which the past 18 months have revealed. After turning from God to a fabricated golden calf, Aaron said to the people of God, "These are your gods" (Ex. 32:4). And lest we think idolatry is an old covenant temptation, John concludes his first epistle exhorting believers to "keep yourselves from idols" (1 Jn. 5:21). There is a worship gap and an idolatry problem, reflecting ecclesiological and eschatological issues. It seems we, the church,

have been tempted by or succumbed to idols and idolatry displacing God. In an account of true conversion, Paul notes of the Thessalonians they "turned to God from idols to serve the living and true God" (1 Thess. 1:9). These believers gathered in local churches are "the pillar and foundation of the truth" (1 Tim. 3:15). The church consists of those who have been transformed by the gospel, who proclaim the gospel, and who manifest the gospel, revealing they are truly citizens of heaven. In this way, the church provides a hope-filled, eschatological apologetic.

We are grateful to the Lord we are able to meet to address these timely topics. We give thanks, we have the opportunity and privilege to learn from our excellent speakers. We are eagerly expectant for what the Lord will teach us.


Questions

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
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



